COURSE DESCRIPTION

In accordance with the College of Nurses of Ontario (CNO) Requisite Skills and Abilities, this course will provide the learner with opportunities to safely apply theoretical concepts and increased complexity in skill sets that maintain and promote health and wellness. With each psychomotor skill learned, students will apply the nursing process and decision-making skills to simulated client scenarios with a focus on application of knowledge, organization, therapeutic communication, infection control and safety. This course will be composed of three components: Theory lecture, laboratory practicum and dosage calculations. (4 hours; 4 credits)
